Message

At the end of every week, as I am rushing to prepare for Shabbat during the last few hours of Friday afternoon, I inevitably ask myself, "Where did this week go?" I sometimes feel as if each Shabbat flows into the next and the week inbetween is nothing but a passing dream. Actually, I feel this way as well towards the end of every month and certainly as I approach another Rosh Hashanah. This year has passed like the sand that trickles down through the hourglass, and I find myself wishing that I could just slow things down.

After graduating high school, I traveled to Israel to study Torah in Yeshivat Hakotel for a year. It was a dream come true to spend a whole year devoted to my Jewish studies and traveling through the Holy Land. It was my first time in Israel and I would get to spend a whole year living in the Old City of Jerusalem. With all that time, I felt like I could do and see everything there was to see. I remember clearly the first day of school. All the students were nervous and excited as the Rosh HaYeshiva - the head rabbi - began to speak. His first words to us were, "The year is already over."

We laughed at the time, but the truth is he was right. Even though each day of Torah study felt powerful and important, by the end of the year the whole experience felt like a dream and that first day with the rabbi's peculiar speech seemed like it had just happened.

Time is strange like that, we sometimes have days that feel like a whole year, and we look back at events that happened years ago and say, "it feels like yesterday". A central purpose of Judaism is to help us harness and be aware of time. Each of our holidays and Sabbaths are tools that we can use to concentrate on the blessing of each moment and our connection to nature and the seasons. On Shabbat, we are commanded not to work or create. Thus, Shabbat teaches us that enjoying and being thankful for our time here on earth is just as important as working and creativity.

So too, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur celebrate the beginning of the Jewish calendar. Our futures lie in the balance, and it is not space and possessions we are concerned about, but rather our time. Will we have many more years to live or, God forbid, few? Will they be years that are pleasant or years filled with difficulties? The High Holidays, the most important moments in Judaism, are those which for millennia have been reminding our people that the most expensive and important commodity in the world is our time. Will we heed the ancient call of the shofar to cherish our time?

My message to you is not a message, but a request. A plea. Please join me in the effort to take our shul to new heights. We need you and we want you. My promise to you is this - if you get involved and you need something to help you get ideas and activities implemented for the betterment of this shul and our community, one phone call is all it will take.

Joan and I wish each and every one of you a sweet year filled with health, and happiness and blessings. I look forward to seeing you in shul, at minyans and working with you on fun and meaningful shul projects.

It is important to have a minyan for all services during the High Holiday season. Please try to be at shul on time when services begin so kaddish can be said.

We wish to maintain the designated time of the schedule, especially for the Shofar, Kol Nidre, and the sermon. Please be in your seats early so services can continue and be completed at the proper time. Arrange your schedule to remain in the synagogue for most, if not all, of the services, so they will continue to be meaningful. Please limit your entrances and exits.

The trustees will help maintain the dignity of the services. Your help, especially when youngsters are visiting, is essential. We know you understand the need for proper decorum so everyone will be able to pray without interruption. The outdoor exits will be opened at specific times to allow for movement of worshippers.

If you have an **Honor** or an **Aliyah**, it is important that you be in your seat 10 minutes earlier than the designated time.


If you are unable to accept your Honor or Aliyah, please notify the office before the holiday. It creates a problem if we are prepared for you and you cannot be there to accept. We understand that situations can and do occur, but please try to notify the office as soon as possible.

HAFTORAH RECITALS

Those gentlemen who wish to recite the Haftorah of their Bar Mitzvah's, or would like to read one within the week of the yahrzeit of their beloved ones, please call Zalman at the shul office.

Holy Day Foods and Customs:

It is customary to eat a new fruit on the second night of Rosh Hashana (after Kiddush). A pomegranate or star fruit is usually used.

Dip Challah in honey for a sweet New Year. 

Dip apples in honey.

Greet one another with L'Shana Tova Tikatevu.

Also, in respect to our members who suffer from allergies, which can result in headaches, asthma, and other respiratory problems, please limit your use of perfume or cologne.

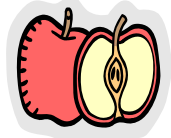


INFORM YOUR RABBI

From Rabbi Elan Adler

Dear MMAE family,

By the time you receive this bulletin, it will have been nearly two months since moving to Israel. It's almost hard to believe. It's a privilege to wake up every morning in Israel, where God has His eyes on His chosen land from the beginning of the year to the end of the year. While we still pinch ourselves at the good fortune of being here, two moments made it very real for me. One, ever since leaving Israel at the age of 6 1/2, the longest I had been in Israel as an adult was 5 weeks as part of a sabbatical a few years ago. When I passed the 5-week mark, I knew we were here to stay. The other milestone occurred on Monday, August 9th, when my Jerusalem Post subscription was finally delivered on its first day. Now, I know I live here. Of course, to say I miss being in the shul is a huge understatement. I miss everything that was precious and warm and loving. I appreciate the various farewells towards the end, and the many who have kept in touch. My High Holidays will hardly be the same without you! You will be in the very capable and loving hands of Rabbi Shapiro, who has brought many personal and professional gifts to his leadership of MMAE.

There is a Jewish weekly newspaper in English called The Forward, which has a monthly column on Hebrew or Yiddish words. One column years ago was on the word "shofar", and the author gave the many shades of meaning of the word. He is usually very thorough, covering every base, but with "shofar" he seemed to have missed its most basic meaning. "Shofar" comes from the word "le-shah-fair", which, in Hebrew, means to polish or beautify something. The idea is this: when we hear the shofar, it should inspire us to think of ways we can "polish" or "beautify" our Jewish lives. How can we make our

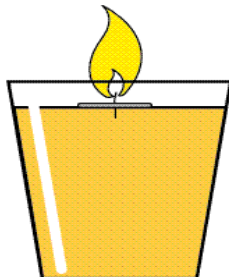

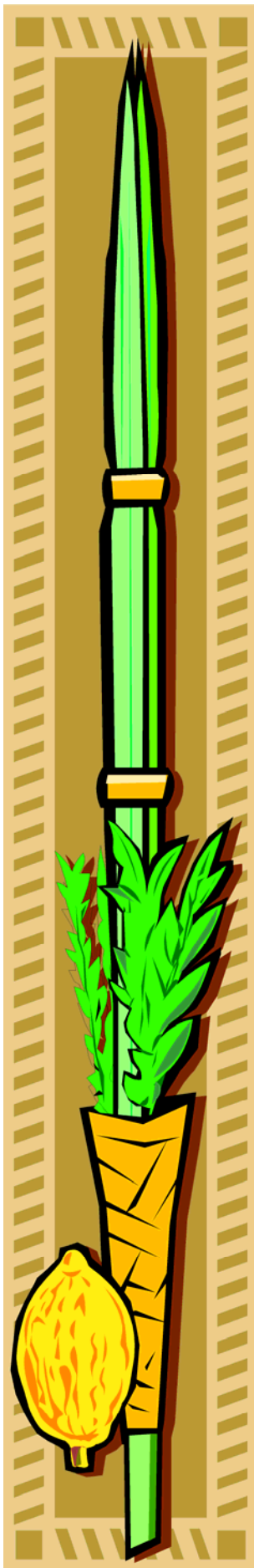

Each set is \$36. This is a meaningful way to upgrade our Jewish lives. Orders **MUST** be in before September 7th, please. Help us meet our goal.



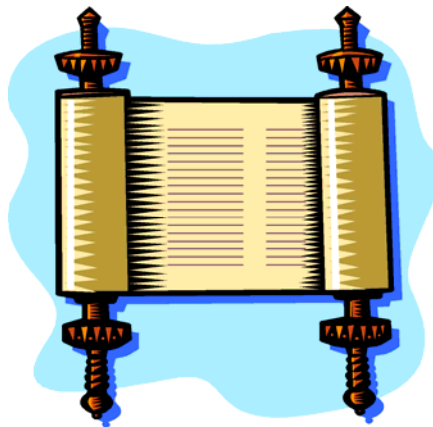

Join Rabbi Shapiro for a “Farewell to the Sukkah” party on Thursday night, September 30th at 6:15 pm.

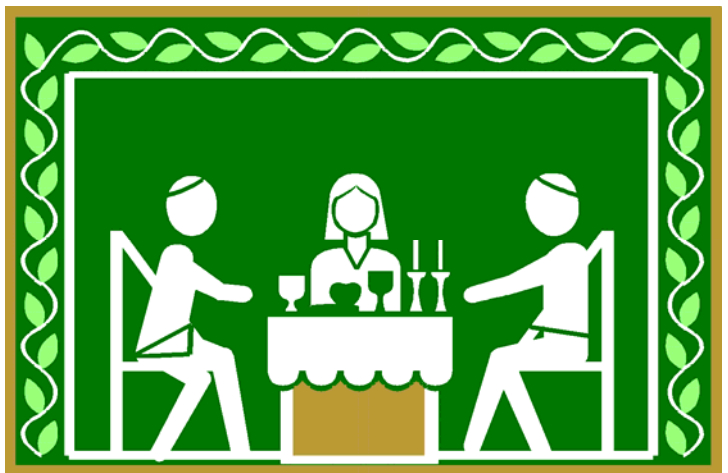
Refreshments will be served in the sukkah for the final time this year and the festivities and dancing will continue inside the shul with

This Simchat Torah (Thursday evening, September 30th and Friday, October 1st), we continue a new innovation. Previously, after the seven Hakafot (circle of dancing with the Torah) with only men participating were completed, the women “were given” a Torah to rejoice with. This is not in consonance with the Torah version of Revelation, which teaches that the Torah was given to both men and women, without either gender having a proprietary advantage over the other.

Our women will take a Torah scroll or two from the very beginning of the Hakafot, and they also will have an opportunity to dance with the Torah scrolls.
